Supporting Your Child in Reading

Reading is the fundamental academic priority of any primary school. Teaching the skill of reading is what we do from the minute the children enter school. We follow a progressive phonics scheme, <u>Little</u> <u>Wandle Letters and Sounds</u>, we surround the children with a wonderful range of books and develop a love of stories. Reading needs to be supported at home to enable children to make good progress. It is a bit like riding a bike; someone can teach you the skill but it is only with time, practise and enjoyment that you develop a love of cycling.

The Department for Education has recommendations for improving reading.

1. **Phonics** – Prioritise children who can't decode or struggling readers; tailor resources to the age of learners.

2. Fluency – Model by reading aloud; lots of practice (choral/echo, etc.); use progressively challenging texts; re-reading familiar books; suitable level of interest and difficulty.

3. Vocabulary and knowledge – Explicitly teach vocabulary; teacher reading aloud; talking about books; reading a lot!

4. Motivation & enjoyment – Develop skills and knowledge for success; sharing books; enjoying books; gain intrinsic motivation; quality books; support children with reading choices; 'just read'.
5. Reading miles – Have regular story time in all year groups; access to a lot of books; supporting book choices; review teaching of comprehension.

We deliver all of the 5 recommendations well here at Marlborough and your support through daily reading, sharing stories, explaining vocabulary and getting those reading miles in makes such a difference. Talk, talk and talk some more to your children about life. Human interaction should always override technology!

Attendance Penalty Notice Warning

If your child is absent from school without authorisation, you will be committing an offence under the Education Act 1996. We may submit a request to Cornwall Council for a Penalty Notice to be issued, in accordance with Sections 444A and 444B of the said Act. Penalty Notices are issued per liable parent, per child and each carry a fine of £80 if paid within 21 days or £160 if paid after this but within 28 days.

If your child is further absent from school without authorisation within any 3- year period, you will be committing a further offence under the Education Act 1996. We may submit a request to Cornwall Council for a Penalty Notice to be issued, in accordance with Sections 444A and 444B of the said Act. Penalty Notices for a second offence are issued per liable parent, per child and each carry a fine of £160, payable within 28 days.

Importantly, fines per parent will be capped to two fines within any three-year period. Once this limit has been reached, other action such as a parenting order or prosecution will be considered.

Failure to pay the Penalty Notice may also result in legal action. If you are prosecuted and attend court because your child has not been attending school, you could get a fine of up to £2,500. Cornwall Council may also apply for the costs incurred in taking the matter to Court, including legal costs. Absence not authorised by the school may also result in a prosecution in the Magistrates' Court under Section 444(1) or Section 444(1A) of the Education Act 1996, leading to a fine of up to £2,500 and/or a custodial sentence. Again, Cornwall Council may also apply for the costs incurred in taking the matter to Court, including legal costs.

Money raised from fines is only used by the local authority to cover the costs of administering the system, and to fund attendance support. Any extra money is returned to the government.
